


CLEAN UP YOUR ACT PROFESSOR VIKAS MITTAL


JEKYLL & HYDE DEALMAKING PROFESSOR HAJO ADAM


8. BOULDIN CREEK CAFE

RIDESHARE: Uber and Lyft operate in Austin; you can also hail a ride through RideAustin, a nonprofit rideshare based in Austin that allows users to round up their fares to benefit local charities as well as a "female driver mode" for women and those that identify as women to request a female driver. rideaustin.com **E-SCOOTERS:** With more than 14,000 e-scooters on the streets in Austin, you won't travel far before you find one. Lime and Bird are the most common, but there are now 10 e-scooter companies operating around town. Download the app, scan the QR code, and get scootin'—most rides will set you back about \$3. You can ride on sidewalks in most parts of town, but always yield to pedestrians. Might we suggest wearing a helmet? austintexas.gov/docklessmobility
